The theme was 'Sugar Beet Harvesting' beginning with the laborious hand method of 'chopping out' to the huge, phenomenally expensive modern harvesters, operated by a small digital pad, which took part in an impressive ring finale each day.

Although the rally site had been extended to the lake-side it was packed to capacity with record entries in all categories. Exhibitors had gone to great lengths to put on displays that were attractive to the general public and interesting to the more knowledgeable. Extra attractions were the noble Shire horses and full sized and miniature scale model steam-

ers. The ring attractions continued steadily throughout each day, knowledgeably compered by Colin Holwell and Michael Hart.









I helped arrange the 3 Samson tractors to be there starting with Gerald Gregory's Samson Model 12-25 Sieve Grip 1916 4 cylinder straight petrol. Then our 1917 Model 6-12 Sieve Grip single cylinder straight petrol and then Allan Sale from Stoke-on-Trent with his 1920 model M 4 cylinder 2 speed straight petrol. This is possibly the first time ever that 3 different Samson tractors have ever been at the same rally in this country, so thank you to all involved.

The Information Centre organised by Viv Gray was again a major asset to both the club and the rally. A display celebrated the club's 40th Anniversary and past activities, attracting much interest. Looked after by some of the committee and the 'Friends of Stradsett' they were busy all weekend with 12 new members and 3 Junior Club members joining and club clothing on sale. The Information Centre is a big help to visiting public to get a feel of what the NVTEC-EA is all about.

The beer marquee provided by UK Bars did a grand job and with the duo, Perfect Vintage performing on Sunday afternoon, Sunday evening and Monday afternoon, the public and exhibitors seemed to be having a great time. New this year was the Sunday night Hoq roast which seemed to go very well.

I just cannot thank everyone personally but I must just say what a fantastic horticultural display we had. Jim and Mel Wakefield organised this and was it was stunning. Everyone seemed to go the extra mile so thank you all for your dedication and support.
