Ever since I was a young boy, I have had an interest in trains as I grew up in Turves, Cambridgeshire right near a railway line. I have quite a decent collection of model trains and carriages etc so whilst having a short break in the Isle of Wight, the opportunity came up to visit the steam railway, I had to go.

On Saturday 26th June it was a lovely sunny morning and there just so happened to be a Beer & Ale festival on at the Isle of Wight stream railway, so it was exceptionally busy. The Isle of Wight steam railway began back in 1971 with half a dozen carriages, The Locomotive Calbourne and a small selection of old wagons. They promote that they are for a family and casual visitor and offer a unique and engaging experience as you step back into the Bygone Era when steam power was the order of the day. This offers the enthusiast access to one of the most complete collection of railway history in Britain. You can take a ride around one of their majestic steam trains and you travel through some of the island's unspoilt countryside. You can hop off at the Havenstreet station to see restoration in action in their carriage and wagon workshop before taking a stroll around the Train Story Discovery Centre.

There was also a Wallis & Stevens Ltd steam roller sitting behind the station which is part of the Isle of Wight traction engine club registration no OT 5327 - it was from the Shanklin Urban District Council and built in 1927.

We had a ride in a S.R 6349 carriage which was used on the London to Brighton line and south coast railway, this was built in 1924. There was lots to see and I was in my element, I even added one of the L4's to my model railway collection with the purchase of the Hornby 00 Mallard.

It was great to see all these old things being looked after and used, credit to all volunteers who look after them.

THE PINK LADIES TRACTOR ROAD RUN



The Pink Ladies' Tractor Road Run returned in style this weekend as a convoy of 110 decorated tractors made their way through Norfolk and Suffolk.

The annual run took place on Sunday 4th July and since it began has raised more than £750,000 in aid of Cancer Research UK's breast cancer appeal.

The run starts at Thorpe Abbotts airfield and then passed through Brockdish, Upper Weybread, Harleston, Pulham St Mary, Rushall and Langmere Green.

This year more than 30 ladies new to the run took part including the beat manager for South Norfolk rural crime, PC Sue Matthews, who was on a police tractor.



Isle of Wight Bus & Coach Museum

On Sunday 27th June whilst we were visiting the Isle of Wight, we took a ride out to the Bus and Coach Museum which has been open since 1997. The museum is staffed by volunteers who share a passion for vintage transport. The museum is just minutes from the centre of Ryde and offers plenty of free outdoor parking. They have taken the time and effort to make the museum look like a former bus depot.

As you walk in, you get a very personal welcome and there is a beautiful old Cheverton Stagecoach. Richard Bird Cheverton, was an established island coachbuilder during the latter part of the nineteenth century, located in Lugely

Street, Newport. Their customers included Queen Victoria and members of her immediate family, primarily for use on the Osborne estate. This Stagecoach was made to the requirement of Albert Vanner and Son of Ryde in 1880 and was used amongst other duties as a daily service between



Ryde and Newport. Up to four horses were required to pull a fully laden coach with a change of horses being made midway. Following the death of Albert Vanner's great niece in 2014, the coach was generously presented to the museum for conservation.

I love the old-style buses just like the Bedford OB



registration number FDL 676, it was in 1925 that the General Motors Organisation of America purchased Vauxhall Motors and early Bedford trucks were badged as Chevrolet Bedford. Primarily producing truck chassis at Luton during the 1930's, passenger chassis were added to their product range and the OB was introduced in 1938. Although a few were built prior to the war, in the immediate post war years the

model achieved notoriety as the small bus that appeared

throughout the country on small rural routes. We had a good two h o u r s l o o k i n g around and it was well worth going.

a very good turn out with over 40 tractors, and it was good to see some old petrol/paraffin tractors on the run such as





Falcone was built between 1950 and 1967 and was the last Guzzi with the horizontal single cylinder 500cc , 4 stroke engine. The engine was developed from the



1921 "Normale" with the classic bore and stroke measurements of 88x82mm.

The chassis was a double cradle with telescopic front forks and a swing arm that was sprung under the engine, assisted by 2 compass shock absorbers. The gear box was a conventional 4 speed unit.

In 1953 the Falcone was given the name "Sport" and a new model called the "Turismo" was introduced, there were styling differences (leg pads on the Turismo and chrome tank on the Sport and various mechanical differences, such as a rework cylinder head, bigger exhaust valves and new connecting rod on the sport, there were also small differences in the camshaft and carburettor.

The Falcone was a much loved motorcycle of the Italian traffic police and remain their official bike up until the late 1970s.

Production was ended in 1967 with the introduction of the V7. The name was kept alive two years later with the introduction of the Nuovo Falcone but with many differences to its earlier model, many people saw it as a continuation of the Mot Guzzii Superlace rather than the original Falcone with which is shared a name.
