tine drag/ cultivator. We took along the youngest known Turner surviving tractor being the MK3 reg NEW 462, this tractor was fully restored in 2006 and has attended many shows and rallies over the years but still won us the trophy for 'Best 1950-1959 Tractor' so very pleased with that. I cannot write about every Turner tractor as much as I would like to, but I must thank all the Turner owners for making our display the biggest and best ever seen, I thank you all for your kind support and all the effort.





Hopefully all of you have read part one, this thanks all of the volunteers, friends of Stradsett, committee and the men who started that all off some 50 years ago.

Now Part two is more about the exhibits. About two and a half years ago, Larry Hopkins suggested us down Turner Yeoman of England as the theme for Stradsett. We already had themes decided for 2022 and 2023 so that took us up to our 50th Anniversary being our 2024 3-day special event. Having a Turner ourselves, in fact the youngest on Larry's register we have always been interested in the history, so this seemed a great idea.

Larry runs the Turner register so has all the contacts so with the help from Colin Howell, we knew we could get a fair display. We wanted to try and beat the previous two records of 17 Turner tractors at one show at the same time. This may sound easy but the last two gatherings were Newark back in 2006 and Malvern in 2011, both were indoor major shows so to beat that at an outdoor event was going to take some doing. I promoted this where I could but Colin and Larry with Reg bringing in the last local ones really pulled out all of the stops. 28 Turner tractors on our rally fields at one time and then to put the icing on the cake, Gerald Gregory brought along his car, this is the only known working serving example of the Turner car and was first sold to a man in Cornwall, the man sadly took delivery of

this car in June 1914, he then went off in the First World War and never returned. The man's widow left the car unused in her garage where it was found 44 years later. This model is a 12/20 Horsepower, it has a 4-cylinder 1822cc Monobloc engine with overhead inlet valves. In 1914 this cost was listed at £285.00 with an extra £45.00 for the electric lighting and starter, very nice car and thanks to Gerald for bringing this to be a part of our Turner display.

Supreme Windows Ltd put up a special trophy for the Turner display and this was won by Peter Williams with his 1950 Turner MK2A with a Leverton-built Turner nine

The second tractor theme this year was at the request of my good friend Ivan Smith; Ivan has been asking for some time for us to have David Brown as a theme, so this was set for the 50th Anniversary along with the Turners. Both British made tractors so there was always going to be a good turnout. Very sadly as you will all know, Ivan passed away very suddenly on Sunday 3 Ist March 2024, just a month before our show so he never got to see the superb display of David Brown tractors at our show. I don't know what the record is for David Browns at one show but we had over 80.

Having a theme certainly brings out tractors and implements not seen out and about on a rally field for years. We took along a tractor that had never been rallied before, this was the 1963 David Brown 850, so recently restored that on Thursday when I unloaded it you could still smell the paint. Sadly, we lost brownie points due to the sticker being on the wrong side, schoolboy error but this has now been rectified, and that's what we get for last minute rush jobs, but we all know that will never change. This David Brown was bult in 1963 with registration number 0JE 292 It belonged to Brian who used it on his small holding at Walpole St Andrew.

We also took along probably the pride of our collection being the 1940's David Brown Vak1 Thresherman Registration no







KPW 44. Now this tractor along with the Turner Mk3 were both sold by E. C Pleasence of Marshland Smeeth (now Richard Askew). Both tractors have never been owned by anyone more than 4 miles for Pleasence's in the past 80 years. When we got this tractor back in 2008, we had to

literally knock the front of the brick built shed down to get it out. They had bricked up the shed some 25 years earlier to prevent the tractor being stolen. This then underwent a major refurbishment and won us 'Best David Brown in Show', what an achievement after 16 years.

After the Second World Ward, where these tractors were used to pull the aircrafts to and from the runways, just 168 were converted into tractors that could also be used in the much-needed agriculture to aid with the thrashing of crops. Not many survive today, again a huge thank you to all the David Brown owners for bringing them out and supporting this event.

We also had a display of 15 tractors that attended the first ever NVTEC-EA rally back in 1974, some still owned by the same people today. The oldest being the Whitting Bull built in 1917, this was some 57 years old at the first rally, now at 107 and still going strong. The Ayres Family were there with their 1938 Bristol 10 and 1949 BMB President, Peter Caley with his 1947 Field Marshall series 2 to just mention a few.

Another section we thought would be interesting was things built in 1974, this allowed people to see how things have changed over the past 50 years, this included Reg Fletchers 1974 Zetor 5711, Peter Thorpes 1974 Ford 3000 again to mention just a few.

The stationary engines did not let us down again with our special theme this year being Ruston & Hornsby and anything with an open crank. What a display they all put on again and we thank you all.

The line up of club stands this year was again superb with Alis Chalmers, Carrington Rally, East Anglia NVTEC-EA, Ford & Fordson, International Harvester Heritage Association, Haddenham Steam Rally, Marsham Group, Mud Munchers 4x4, Notts NVTEC, Old Skool Superstox, Norton Owners Club, Peterborough Farm Machinery Presentation Club (Winning the trophy for best club stand), Downham Market Young Farmers,

Ferguson Heritage Club and what a display they all put on, the work these all do is amazing.

The mini tractor pulling was going on all weekend as normal entertaining all.



We did however have to put up a health and safety notice up to warn the public about Peter Caley and Peter Thorpe working the Foster Thrashing Set (Caution Geriatrics At Work) It did give us all a smile, they took it well.

The stradsett Park Vintage Rally is now a very well known and respected rally/ show and our 2025 show will be held over the first May bank holiday weekend. The show could not go ahead without all the wonderful and kind helpers from all the stewards, friends of Stradsett, committee members etc and of course all the dedicated exhibitors and we must thank them all for a great show. Don't miss this year's show on Sunday 4th and Monday 5th May 2025 with this year's theme being 100 years of Caterpillar, 80 years of the Fordson E27N and the Evolution of tractor cabs.

We took the Ford Workmaster 641, this was built in 1958 and fitted with a 4cylinder straight petrol engine and 6-volt electrics. This won us the Keith Raynes trophy for best tractor in the show, so I was very please with that. The show as per the name is predominantly a country fayre but the vintage side is always a good display to look around with full sized steam engines, miniature steam engines, cars, motor bikes, ex-military, stationary engines, horticultural and bygone displays, so there is something for everyone. The 2025 Stradsett Rally is featuring the evolution of cabs and there were 3 very good examples here to see. Firstly no.33 was Stephen Spencer with a 1969 David Brown 990 fitted with a Q cab, secondly came

no.34 Wayne Waller with a 1973 International 454 fitted with an L Cab and then no.35 Mr Chris Deeble with his 1977 Leyland 245, fitted with a Lambourn MK 4 safety cab. All very good-looking classic tractors.





Peter Copeman from Gayton was very happy to allow my grandson Alex to sit on his stunning 1901 Marshall Convertible Compound Traction Engine Hermit, works number 35978 built in 1901. This engine was delivered new to a farm in Scotland. It was then purchased in 1914 by the war department and sent to France to haul guns and ammunition. In 1919 the engine returned to England to work in Devon County Council as a road roller unit 1975 when it was again sold, this time into preservation, the engine was then converted back to a traction engine. Hermit came to Norfolk back in 2012 when purchased by Peter and Jenny Copeman who now love and cherish this great old engine. Thanks to Peter for the demonstration and his time.

in the world. The Wests brought along their 1919 Titan 10-20 that once formed part of the





That of course was just one part of our club display.



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
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Philip Gammon: Rally commentator
